
STAY SAFE TO STAY OPEN

"What is your plan for the fall?" This is understandably the most common question we have been getting from parents, students, and community members this summer. After a surreal spring with an unprecedented three-month school closure and shift to remote learning, this is the question on everyone's mind.

Throughout this pandemic we have all witnessed the ever evolving understanding of this virus and the associated guidance that goes along with it. Opinions are varied and often emotionally charged which we completely understand. As both an educator and parent, I too worry about our kids, community, and staff and can find it challenging to translate all the noise on this issue into actionable steps forward. Even members of the scientific community can differ on how to best manage the virus while moving forward with our lives. I want to thank our parents and staff for your strong participation in the surveys we published in June. Over 1,400 parents and more than 300 staff members provided feedback to support our **planning efforts.** I respect that we have strong views that range from calls to open schools without restriction to the belief that we should provide only virtual options until a vaccine is deployed, and everything in between. Although opinions may vary on what is best, we have some common ground that we need to stand on together - we all want our students to learn and we want this done in a way that protects the health of our kids, families, and staff to the best of our ability. What this ultimately looks like will be driven by the guidance we receive from healthcare, state and local agencies, and through a collaborative process with our staff and other stakeholders. It will require patience, understanding, trust, and at times, compromise.

On June 25th, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) published guidance for school re-entry during COVID-19. In that document, the AAP states "...the AAP strongly advocates that all policy considerations for the coming school year should start with the goal of having students physically present in schools." (American Academy of Pediatrics, 2020, p. 1). The AAP supports this recommendation in practical terms identifying the harmful effects of students not being in school and references the "preponderance of evidence" that children and adolescents are less likely to be symptomatic, less likely to have severe disease, and may be less likely to spread infection (American Academy of Pediatrics, 2020, p. 2). The AAP advocates for comprehensive virus mitigation protocols to reduce spread and protect more vulnerable populations. On June 22nd, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) released Education Forward: Safely and Successfully Reopening Wisconsin Schools. In this document, the DPI acknowledges that the virus will remain in circulation until a vaccine is developed and

widely used and that in the interim, additional



TEACHING AND LEARNING

We learned many things during remote learning this spring that will be applied as we prepare for the fall. Staff will be engaged in professional development this summer to help prepare for different instructional models that may occur during the 2020-21 school year. This includes in-person, virtual, or a blended model of instruction. Resources and services to support students, teachers, and parents are also being developed. While learning environments may shift to look different throughout this year, teachers and staff are dedicated to making sure caring for students and their learning remains our top priority.

TECHNOLOGY

Comfortably and effectively transitioning to remote learning with access to necessary technology was the priority for the Technology Department. A phone support number was created for families to easily request Chromebooks for virtual instruction. Once all initial support needs had been deployed, this support hotline was repurposed for families with software, additional hardware, and repair needs as students learned from home. In addition, the team provided support and resources for staff to best enhance their remote teaching. Our learning coaches were instrumental in technical support for staff as they developed lessons to be used online through both Seesaw and Canvas Learning Management Systems.

STUDENT SERVICES

COVID-19 changed the educational landscape. Pewaukee's Student Services Department was ready to set sail, transforming its service delivery model to support online learning in a matter of days. Our teachers and paraprofessionals adapted and modified their curriculum for a virtual format. Our speech-language therapists, occupational therapists, and physical therapists were able to offer teletherapy services. School Psychologists and counselors continued their weekly groups via zoom and google meetings. The responsiveness of the department reminds us how lucky we are to work alongside such amazing professionals. Staff never lost sight of student goals and needs, finding innovative ways to meet them during unprecedented times.

COMMUNICATION AND **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

Since March and looking ahead to the 2020-21 school year, we are utilizing a variety of communication methods to keep our stakeholders informed about the status of our schools. This includes direct parent letters from building principals, timely website updates, social media blasts, weekly "PSD Post" newsletters, and consistent messaging from our Superintendent, Dr. Mike Cady. As we navigate through these times, we also continue to highlight our students and their educational successes. The involvement of our community and continued reasons to celebrate our #PiratePride has made it effortless to focus on the gratitude we have towards this wonderful community.



waves of infection could occur and result in changes to school operations or closure (DPI, 2020, p. 4). The DPI advises schools to plan for multiple scenarios that include in-person learning, blended learning, and virtual learning approaches (DPI, 2020, p. 8). The guidance from DPI, in collaboration with the Department of Health Services, calls for implementation of infection control/mitigation strategies to limit the spread of infectious diseases (DPI, 2020, p. 37). Throughout the summer the district has engaged in weekly collaboration with Waukesha County school districts, the County Executive, and the Waukesha Health Department. The County is embracing a Stay Safe to Stay Open approach for businesses and our schools. This includes the implementation of virus mitigation strategies to reduce the spread of infection. The Pewaukee School District will continue to lean on the guidance from healthcare, state, and local agencies as we develop our plans for reopening.

In my June letter to all families I shared that it is our goal to return to in-person instruction with students in September while also planning for scenarios that include blended learning approaches (a combination of in-person and remote/virtual learning),

and fully remote or virtual learning options. As we work daily on our plans for the fall we are guided by our core values that include the health and wellness of students and staff (physical & social-emotional) and student learning. Our intention is to create plans that give us the best opportunity to have students back and to **stay safe to stay** open. In addition we understand how important it will be to be flexible, responsive to changing conditions, and to personalize our approaches for the different circumstances that exist for our students, families, and staff. We are committed to doing our very best to manage safety and provide the best learning experiences we can for our students. To be successful, we will need the support of our students and parents. This situation is more a marathon than a sprint and it will be by sticking together, and staying resilient, that we will be able to best serve the needs of our students. Our detailed plan for the opening of schools will be communicated to parents by no later than August 1st.

Although still in the planning stages, the project will not only provide an outdoor learning space for our elementary kids, but a real-world experience for high school students as well.














FLAT MRS. R.

from Arkansas State, and 12 years of experience in the classroom teaching first, fourth, sixth and seventh grade, Chack rose to the top of more than 100 candidates.



During the last week of remote learning teachers divided and conquered, visiting **204 homes** of the 8th grade class. Each student was given a yard


sign to proudly share their accomplishment of graduating into high school. It was also a great excuse for our staff to reconnect with with their students pass their normal Zoom calls.



KEY WORK OF YOUR SCHOOL BOARD: POLICY AND PROCEDURES



This is the third of five articles about the responsibilities of the Board of Education. **The third** responsibility of the Board of Education and the focus of this article is developing policies, programs, and procedures that create the foundation for students' academic achievement. Previously, we covered the need for a Board to provide a vision for what we want our school district to become. Accountability, the second topic we covered, is the responsibility of the Board to use our precious resources to continuously raise student achievement results.

Under the Board of Education section of the Pewaukee School District website you can find the Board of Education Policy and Procedure manual. The Board is a governing body and does not participate in daily decision making. It hires a superintendent to operate the district's daily operations. The school policies are developed, updated, revised and improved on a continuous basis by the Board. These define the framework for the management of the district. They keep the district on a steady path toward attaining the vision, mission, and goals that have been developed with community stakeholders through

the strategic planning process.









NOW MORE THAN EVER, THANK YOU.

To say we are incredibly grateful for our Pewaukee staff is an understatement. During the guick transition to remote learning, our teachers and staff adapted to the situation both professionally and gracefully. A policy answers the questions "who", "what", and "why". They are created to achieve goals and to preemptively resolve issues that might arise in the daily function of a school. Some policies, by their nature, need to answer the auestion "how". This is the function of a specified procedure that accompanies a policy. A procedure provides the method of implementation to achieve the goal of a procedure.

The development of a procedure that supports the intent of a policy is developed by the superintendent. These procedures are reviewed by the Board for proper alignment with the desired outcome of the policy. If a procedure exists for a policy, it will be spelled out right after the policy in the manual.

In a broad sense, the policy manual represents the intersection of the vision for the district and the way in which the organization will be held accountable. The policies also provide context for the remaining two key work areas. The next article will address Community Leadership and Engagement of Stakehold-

ers. The last article will discuss the relationship between the Board and the superintendent as a team working together to Open the Door to Each Child's Future.

The Pewaukee School District's IT staff worked around the clock to provide assistance with technology necessary for an effective learning environment throughout remote learning. The group deployed a "Technology Hotline" number that could be reached at any time for assistance with anything from Zoom conferencing questions to additional hardware requests.

3D PRINTED MASKS

Joining Concordia University's initiative to 3D print and distribute respirators to local healthcare workers, PHS' Ben Lamp and ACMS' Scott Roehl sprung into action in March to help fill the production gap of one of the most necessary medical supplies for professionals combatting the novel coronavirus. Taking about 6 hours to create one reusable respirator mask, both teachers brought the District's 3D printers home and worked around the clock to provide necessary PPE for our local frontline workers.

In late April, another initiative to utilize our 3D printers was sparked by PHS physical education teacher, Karen Mendez. With the skillful help of Ben Lamp, Mendez graciously donated filament, plastic transparency sheets, and the elastic for the headband to create 40 face shields.

SNACKS DONATED TO **HEALTHCARE WORKERS**

Thanks to the leadership of PHS Science teacher, Ms Klemme, PHS staff raised \$650 to donate to snacks for healthline workers at Froedtert Hospital. With the help of Amanda Sorkness, PHS School Counselor, the goodies were delievered May 1st.

PLE SUPPLY PICK UP

Remote learning doesn't always mean virtual learning, especially for our PLE students. Always up for the challenge, teachers, paraprofessionals, and administrators bagged and organized 1,033 supply packages for each one of our PLE students the week after the school closing. Each bag contained materials hand-picked by their teacher, specific to their class.









Kevin Dresdow (PSD's Food Service Director), Klayton Mutchler (District Head Chef), Marty Van Hulle (Director of Teaching and Learning), and volunteer paraprofessionals, are leading the way to provide lunches and breakfast to our community members in need. Partnering with Chartwells School Dining Services and Riteway Busing, PSD has provided 300 meals daily, totaling 14,000 meals served. Since its launch on March 18th, four local parks were used as pick up locations to support our community and students who were in need of this assistance.

After the announcement of the school closure on March 13th, the quick turnaround to provide the necessary equipment for remote and virtual learning was paramount. Under the direction of **Rachel Yurk, Chief Information Technol**ogy Officer, 234 chromebooks were requested and successfully deployed to students within just the first week of remote learning. Personal calls were made to each family to inquire about any additional assistance during this time. By the end of the year, 379 additional computers were distributed, totaling 1,795 chromebooks provided to K-12 students for a successful virtual learning experience.

Throughout the spring, health care supplies that were stocked at our schools were gathered and donated to Waukesha Memorial Hospital through their donation center. This included masks, gloves, and eye **protection.** Continued efforts to donate items to the Pewaukee Police and Fire Department also became a top priority.

On March 20th, Pewaukee School District's Food Service Program donated extra shipments of food to the Waukesha Food Pantry that would have otherwise been used for upcoming school lunches.
